General Science, Life Science, Physical Science, Biology, Chemistry, Marine Biology, Physics

Elementary School:

Science (Ages 5–10)

Melinda Rogers; Rebecca Black ... \$90.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$70

This is where Science, Etc. began! Following in the footsteps of Mrs. Winsor, the school's founder, Mrs. Rogers and Mrs. Black carry on her incredible legacy with science classes that allow students to explore God's universe based on the six days of creation from the book of Genesis. The elementary basics of physical, earth, and biological sciences are taught along with a fun look into God's amazing outer space. The class is interactive and hands on, giving students constant opportunities for creativity and experimentation.

And, of course, Mrs. Winsor's legendary #1 rule is kept firmly in place:

Middle School and High School:

Bridge Science (Ages 11-12)

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 4
Maximum number of students: 15

Let's explore how God designed things to work! This new class has been created this year to "bridge the gap" between students' abilities and interests in elementary science and our existing Life Science class. Students will utilize various works by David Macaulay as well as fun hands-on activities to discover scientific principles, machines, architecture, and the engineering design process. Students will keep lab notebooks to record their vocabulary, drawings, and observations. Disclaimer: This course includes a woolly mammoth!

Life Science (Ages 11–13)

Chris Morris...\$96.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$75**Note:** Minimum number of students for class to make: 2

Maximum number of students: 20

Get ready to discover more about the awesome detail and intricacy of God’s creation! Learn about the scientific method, scientific analysis, the classification system and significant scientific discoveries while exploring a variety of topics in the life sciences.

In addition to the experiments/explorations in the book, we will practice classifying leaves, insects and wildflowers, dissect a worm, frog, starfish, sheep’s brain and heart. We will also explore how human actions can positively or negatively impact environments.

The students will have weekly homework assignments covering material in the text, weekly quizzes, and four tests over the course of the year. Additionally, each student will practice keeping a lab notebook that serves as a record of the details of class experiments, explorations, and observations.

Required text: *Exploring Creation with General Science*, 3rd Edition, Seligson, Apologia Ed. Ministries. (Student TEXT ONLY)

Physical Science (Ages 13–14)

Peggy Davis ... \$96.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$70

This course covers chemistry, physics, and Earth science topics which will give the middle school student the knowledge they need to be prepared for high school courses.

Lab experiences will dominate class time and all of the experiments in the text will be included. The student will also solve a crime using chemistry, learn to identify and separate substances, discover the properties of dry ice, build a matchbook rocket and apply math skills to science through working with measurements within the metric system.

Although it is generally recommended as an 8th-grade course, students can use it for their 9th-grade coursework. The students have weekly homework assignments and are tested when modules are completed. They will be encouraged to study independently and learn how to prepare for tests. A lab manual will be kept in the classroom and graded twice a year.

Prerequisite: Successful completion of 7th grade math. The math portion of the Physical Science course involves:

- Converting measurements/units
- Simple rearranging of equations
- Dividing and multiplying fractions

Required text: *Exploring Creation with Physical Science*, 3rd Edition, Dincher, Apologia Educational Ministries and *Test and Solutions Manual*. (The Student Notebook is not needed.) Used textbooks may be available—contact Peggy Davis.

Biology (Ages 15-16)

Chris Morris ... \$100.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$75**Note:** Minimum number of students for class to make: 2

Maximum number of students: 20

Be awed by God's creation. This course uses experiential learning to develop a strong background in microscopy, cellular biology, and ecosystems with a lesser emphasis on biochemistry and Mendelian genetics.

Complete a survey of the organisms classified in the five kingdoms. Examine organisms using a microscope. Learn to identify flora and fauna through class activities. Dissect a worm, clam, crayfish, grasshopper, fish, frog, and fetal pig.

Students will have weekly homework assignments, weekly quizzes, projects, and four quarterfinal tests. Student lab notebooks will also be graded quarterly. There is no math requirement; however, there are 368 vocabulary words listed (fair warning!)

Required text: *Exploring Creation with Biology*, 3rd Edition, Dincher, (TEXT ONLY) Apologia Educational Ministries.

Chemistry (Ages 15-18)

Peggy Davis...\$100.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$70

This course gives the student a rigorous foundation in chemistry. It covers classification of matter, the mole concept, stoichiometry, thermodynamics, kinetics, acids and bases, redox reactions, solutions, atomic structure, molecular geometry, the gas laws, and equilibrium.

Students will perform all the textbook experiments and experiments from the supplementary Microchemistry booklet. The students have weekly homework assignments and a biweekly test. A lab manual will be kept in the classroom and graded twice a year.

Prerequisite : Algebra I must be successfully completed. The student should own a calculator and know how to use it.

Required text: *Discovering Design with Chemistry*, Dr. Jay L. Wile, Published by Berean Builders and the *Test Booklet and Answer Key*. Used copies are available at a discount. If interested, contact Peggy Davis.

Physics (High School)

Dwight Debenport ... \$100.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$30

Physics is one of the oldest academic disciplines. In this course we will study motion, energy, and the rules that govern our universe. My goal with this class is to give students a strong conceptual understanding of the rules of spacetime and prepare STEM-minded students for college level Physics. We will cover Newton's Laws & Applications, the Physics of Motion, Work & Energy, Momentum, Gravity, Waves, Optics, Electricity, and Magnetism. Each week I introduce the topic from the text and we work examples together before doing an activity that requires application, analysis, and/or synthesis of the information.

Students should expect to spend at least 4 hours outside of class studying. This course requires an understanding of algebraic principles and should be taken after completing Algebra 1 and Geometry.

Required: TI-83 or -84 graphing calculator, any edition, or an iPad or laptop with access to Desmos to bring to every class.

Required text: *Exploring Creation with Physics*, 2nd Edition, Jay L. Wile, and the Solutions and Tests book.

Marine Biology (Ages 16–18)

Chris Morris ... \$100.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$75

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 2
Maximum number of students: 20

Dive deep into God's creation by studying the organisms that live in and near the oceans which cover nearly three-fourths of the globe. Learn about marine life in each of the five kingdoms through class activities. We will study organisms that live in ecosystems close to us in tidal zones as well as unbelievably far from us in the deepest depths of the ocean.

This course uses experiential learning to develop a strong understanding of ecosystems and the various types of symbiotic relationships seen in the marine environment. We will dissect a clam, starfish, shark and squid. We will examine how ecologists study the various ecosystems as well as explore how human actions can positively or negatively impact these ecosystems. Students will have weekly homework assignments, weekly quizzes, quarter projects, and four quarter final tests. Student lab notebooks will also be graded quarterly. There is no math requirement.

MATHMATICS

Math Teaching Games, Saxon 5/4, Saxon 6/5, Saxon 7/6, Pre- Algebra, Geometry, Algebra 1 &2, Pre-Calculus, Consumer Math

Elementary School:

Math Teaching Games 2 (Ages 7-8)

Kelly Sterling...\$45.00 per month (1 hour)

Supply Fee: \$40

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 4

Designed for 2nd and 3rd grade math levels. Students should know addition and subtraction math facts.

This class will introduce students to math concepts including telling time to the minute, graphing data, fractions, measurements, symmetry, geometry, adding two- and three-digit numbers up to 100, introduction to multiplication and division, money, word problems, perimeter and area, rounding numbers, etc.

The first part of the class will focus on introducing new concepts and practicing math facts. Timed tests will be given in class. The second part of the class will focus on playing games related to the concepts learned that day.

This course is designed to challenge, strengthen, and solidify math concepts, while balancing it out with fun “hands-on” manipulatives and activities. I desire for students to have an understanding that math has a strong connection to the world around them. Students will be expected to work on math facts ten minutes each day outside of class.

Math Teaching Games 3 (Ages 9-10)

Kelly Sterling... \$45.00 per month (1 hour)

Supply Fee: \$40

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 4

Designed for 4th and 5th grade math level. Students should know multiplication and division math facts.

This class is intended to be a support class to your current math curriculum at home. I will work with you and your child to tailor instruction and games that will build his or her math abilities in a fun and encouraging way. It is intended to be a class with an enjoyable atmosphere with many thought-provoking activities and games related to your child’s level of math.

This class will work on memorizing the facts you would like your child to learn. The child will either work on addition/subtraction, multiplication/division or percentages/fractions. Students will be expected to work on math facts ten minutes each day outside of class.

The first part of the class will focus on introducing new concepts, practicing math facts, and independent learning centers. Timed tests will be given in class. The second part of the class will focus on playing games related to the concepts learned that day.

Many challenging math skills can be learned through play, and your child won't even know it. I hope this will be a very creative class as we blend games and individualized instruction to support your curriculum at home.

Saxon Math 5/4 (Ages 8–10)

Kelly Sterling...\$45.00 per month (1 hour)

Supply Fee: \$20

Saxon 5/4 is designed for students in grade 4, or grade 5 students who are struggling with math. Saxon 5/4 is a step-by-step integrated approach perfect for many 8-10 year-olds. Saxon curriculum is well known for the way it provides “incremental development with continual practice and review.”

The students will begin by reviewing a variety of concepts such as subtraction, place value, and missing addends. The lessons increase in difficulty to include adding three-digit numbers, subtracting numbers with re-grouping, reading time, multiplying three or more factors, dividing with two-digit answers, simple fractions and more.

Parents will grade homework, so students can correct errors immediately. Tests will be taken in class and graded by the teacher. Student learning is supported by teacher created videos.

Middle School and High School:

Saxon Math 6/5 (Ages 9-12)

Kelly Sterling... \$48.00 per month (1 hour)

Supply Fee: \$20

Saxon 6/5 is designed for students in grade 5, or grade 6 students who are struggling with math. Saxon 6/5 is a step-by-step integrated approach perfect for many 9-12 year-olds. Saxon curriculum is well known for the way it provides “incremental development with continual practice and review.”

The students will build on addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. Students will learn about making a multiplication table, adding/subtracting fractions with a common denominator, multiplying by multiples of 10 and 100, perimeter, simple probability, decimal parts of a meter, reciprocals, volume, square roots, graphing points on a coordinate plane, and more.

Parents will grade homework, so students can correct errors immediately. Tests will be taken in class and graded by the teacher. Student learning is supported by teacher created videos.

Saxon 7/6 (Ages 10-13)

Carol Hofford...\$96.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$25

The goal of this course is to build mathematical curiosity and determination as students discover God's mathematical order. Students should have a firm grasp of basic addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. The students will learn about functions and coordinate graphing, integers, exponential expressions, and prime factorization, the order of operations, number lines, decimal place value, how to find the percent of a number, how to round decimal numbers, attributes of geometric solids, and more.

Parents will grade homework, so students can correct errors immediately. Tests will be taken in class and graded by the teacher. Student learning is supported by teacher created videos watched before each class.

Required Text: *Saxon 7/6 Workbook* (ISBN-10: 1591413192), *Test Booklet* (ISBN-10: 1591413230), and *Solution Manual* (ISBN-10: 1591413273)

Pre-Algebra (Ages 12-13)

Carol Hofford...\$96.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$25

The goal of this course is to build mathematical curiosity and determination as students discover God's mathematical order. Students will continue to expand their use of basic skills, using them to learn new concepts about geometry, ratios and proportions, prime and composite numbers, fractions and decimals, algebraic reasoning, the Pythagorean Theorem, and more. This curriculum constantly reviews old material while introducing new concepts, building on the old.

The course will require homework (graded by the parent and corrected by students), homework quizzes given in class and tests (taken at home but graded by the teacher). Student learning is supported by teacher created videos watched before each class. Each student will need to purchase the textbook.

Required Text: *Saxon Algebra 1/2*, 3rd edition homeschool student text and *solutions manual*.

Algebra I (Ages 13-14)

Carol Hofford...\$100.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$25

The goal of this course is to build mathematical curiosity and determination as students discover God's mathematical order. Some topics covered are signed numbers, exponents, roots, absolute value, equations and inequalities, scientific notation, unit conversions, polynomials, graphs, quadratic equations, and much more. This curriculum constantly reviews old material while introducing new concepts, building on the old.

The course will require homework (graded by the parent and corrected by students), homework quizzes given in class and tests (taken at home but graded by the teacher). Student learning is supported by teacher created videos watched before each class. Each student will need to purchase the textbook.

Required text: *Saxon Algebra 1, 3rd edition*, student text and *solutions manual*.

Geometry (High School)

Dwight Debenport... \$100.00 per month (2hours)

Supply Fee: \$30

We will study Euclidean facts regarding points, lines, angles, triangles, circles, polygons, solids and classical constructions and transformations. Some analytical geometry and trigonometry will be incorporated, and geometric relationships and deductive reasoning strategies will be used to solve problems. My intention is to expand on the Math U See curriculum and help my students make connections and see patterns in mathematics that make Geometry more comprehensible for them.

This course is a complement to the students' home study of mathematics. It provides the pacing, structure, and grades. Each week I introduce the topic from the text and we work examples together before doing an activity that requires application, analysis, and/or synthesis of the information. Some students may benefit from a parent or tutor working with them on homework for approximately 1 hour per week and all should expect to spend an additional 4 hours per week working outside of class.

Geometry is recommended after completion of Algebra 1 and before Algebra 2, but with instructor approval it may be taken after Algebra 2 or concurrently with Algebra 2.

Required: TI-83 or -84 graphing calculator, any edition, or an iPad or laptop with access to Desmos to bring to every class.

Required text: *Math-U-See Geometry Student Pack* (available at store.mathusee.com and possibly Amazon.com), and *Math-U-See Geometry Instruction Manual*, edition 2009 or newer (used is perfectly fine!).

Algebra 2 (High School)

Dwight Debenport... \$100.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$30

Algebra II provides the basis for advanced STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) study. It builds on evaluation and graphing concepts learned in Algebra 1 and covers imaginary numbers; rational, exponential, logarithmic expressions; conic sections; and an introduction to trigonometry and matrices. Activities include using our graphing calculators to write beginner-level programs and explore function behavior. My intention is to expand on the Math U See curriculum and help my students make connections and see patterns in mathematics that make Algebra II more comprehensible for them.

This challenging course is a complement to the students' home study of mathematics. It provides pacing, structure, and grades. Each week I introduce the topic from the text and we work examples together before doing an activity that requires application, analysis, and/or synthesis of the information. Some students may benefit from a parent or tutor working with them on homework for approximately 1 hour per week and all should expect to spend an additional 4 hours per week working outside of class.

Required: TI-83 or -84 graphing calculator, any edition, or an iPad or laptop with access to Desmos to bring to every class.

Required text: *Math-U-See Algebra II Student Pack* (available at store.mathusee.com and possibly Amazon.com), and *Math-U-See Algebra II Instruction Manual*, edition 2009 or newer (used is perfectly fine!).

Consumer Math (High School)

Kelly Sterling...\$100.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$30

Students will study and review arithmetic skills they can apply in their personal lives and in their future careers. The first half of the year begins with a focus on occupational topics; it includes details on jobs, wages, deductions, taxes, insurance, recreation, spending and transportation. The second half of the year will focus on personal finances, checking and savings accounts, loans and buying on credit, automobile expenses and housing expenses.

Math skills and concepts covered in this course include: whole numbers, fractions, decimals, percentages, mean, median, mode, basic operations on a calculator, computing mentally and estimating.

Pre-Calculus (High School)

Dwight Debenport... \$100.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$30

Pre-Calculus teaches concepts and builds on calculator fluency that must be mastered before enrollment in a college-level calculus course. The emphasis will be on Trigonometry and we will focus on making the math click for visual learners: representing functions graphically. Quadratic relations will be represented in polar and rectangular coordinates and parametric coordinates in the form of vectors. The course also builds on the formal study of functions and relations begun in Algebra 1 & 2 and introduces limits, providing a bridge to calculus. My intention is to expand on the Math U See curriculum and help my students make connections and see patterns in mathematics that make Pre-Calculus more comprehensible for them.

This course is a complement to the students' home study of mathematics. It provides pacing, structure, and grades. Each week I introduce the topic from the text and we work examples together before doing an activity that requires application, analysis, and/or synthesis of the information. Students should expect to spend at least 4 hours outside of class studying.

Required: TI-83 or -84 graphing calculator, any edition. Access to an iPad or laptop with the Desmos app or online access to Desmos is a plus.

Elementary School:

Literature/Writing 1 (Ages 7–8)

Heather Spencer ... \$45.00 per month (1 hour)

Supply Fee: \$30

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 4
 Maximum number of students: 12

Prerequisite: Your child should be able to read easy books (late first-grade at least) to do well in this class.

This course is a wonderful combination of learning to write as well as reading age appropriate literature that models good writing. Students learn what a topic sentence is and then gradually expand on that, learning to add sentences that keep to the topic until they create a nice three-point paragraph. Students' own experiences are used to make the writing interesting and personal.

Your child will also learn about genres, messages in stories, summarizing, characters, setting, story structure, and more. We will read interesting stories, and your child will be encouraged to block out a certain amount of time each day to read books that interest him or her.

Students work on a beautiful composition book that will be a reference and keepsake for years to come. Required books will be provided to borrow if you do not have access to them. The goal is to develop in students a love of reading and writing that will last a lifetime.

Note: There will be a homework packet to complete each week, consisting of a dictation exercise, and a study guide exercise.

Literature/Writing 2 (Ages 9-10)

Heather Spencer...\$45.00 per month (1 hour)

Supply Fee: \$30

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 4
 Maximum number of students: 12

Prerequisite: Literature/Writing 1 or a reading level of at least the second-grade.

This course is a continuation of Literature/Writing 1, although students do not necessarily need to take the first course to do well in the second course. It is a combination of writing as well as reading appropriate literature that models good writing.

Students work with sentences and paragraphs, making them interesting and varied. The end product will be a nice five-paragraph essay. Yes, seven and eight-year-olds can do this! Students' own experiences are used to make the writing interesting and personal.

Some story elements we will cover include genres, theme, character traits, point of view, setting, plot and making inferences. We will read interesting stories, and your child will be encouraged to block out a certain amount of time each day to read books that interest him or her.

Students work on a beautiful composition book that will be a reference and keepsake for years to come. Books will be provided to borrow if you do not have access to them. The goal is to develop in your child a love of reading and writing that will last a lifetime.

Note: There will be a homework packet each week, consisting of a study guide exercise and an occasional dictation exercise.

Supply Fee: \$30

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 4
 Maximum number of students: 12

Prerequisite: Your child should be able to read on at least a third-grade level to do well in this course.

This course is an introduction to a variety of age-appropriate literature. My desire is that students learn to love reading just for the sheer joy of reading. Along the way they will be introduced to story elements such as setting, character, conflict, and climax. Some of the literary terms we will discuss include character, dialect, dialogue, foreshadowing and imagery.

Students will have the pleasure of reading literature from different genres and a variety of time periods. In addition, they will be encouraged to visit the library and set aside a block of time each day to read. Books will be provided to borrow if you do not have access to them.

Students work on a beautiful composition book that will be a reference and keepsake for years to come. Part of the composition book will be devoted to recording various Latin and Greek roots to help in vocabulary development. So ... on that note ... Let the reading begin!

Note: There will be a homework packet each week, consisting of a study guide exercise, and a Greek/Latin root quiz every eight weeks.

In this course, your child will learn parts of speech that include nouns, pronouns, verbs, adjectives, adverbs, prepositions and objects of prepositions. Using *Shurley English* and other materials, we will also cover the mechanics of a sentence, what makes a good sentence and then a good paragraph.

Toward the end of the year, your child will be writing short 2-point expository paragraphs. Class time will include mostly grammar practice, but I will sneak in a little spelling to round things out.

Note: There will be a homework packet each week for your child to complete on the days he/she is not in class.

Prerequisite: Your child must be able to read on at least a late first-grade reading level to take this course.

Grammar/Spelling 2 (Ages 8-9)

This course expands on what your student has learned in Grammar 1. Although having taken Grammar 1 would make it a little easier, it is not completely necessary for taking Grammar 2, since there is a good deal of review at the beginning.

Using *Shurley English* as our starting point, we will continue with the parts of speech already learned but add layers to them. Did you know that different parts of speech are used differently depending on where they are in the sentence?

We will do lots of work on improving sentences, and paragraphs, and will expand on our expository writing.

This is foremost a grammar course, but there will also be spelling lessons and a little writing to cement the grammar skills.

Note: There will be a homework packet each week for your child to complete on the days he/she is not in class.

Prerequisite: Your child needs to be reading on at least a second-grade level to do well in this course.

If your child has had no *Shurley English*, you might consider signing up for the Grammar 2 class instead. Jumping right into the Grammar 3 class may prove difficult, since we cover a tremendous amount of material in the first two courses using nomenclature unique to *Shurley English*. It is the parents' choice, however.

Grammar/Spelling 4 (Ages 11–12)

This is foremost a grammar course, but there will also be weekly spelling and vocabulary lessons to help with their writing.

Handwriting is an essential skill used in many subjects for taking notes, taking tests, and doing classroom work and homework. It is also a skill used throughout one's life for jotting down notes, writing letters, filling out forms, and signing paperwork. Students are never too old to learn proper handwriting and/or correct bad handwriting habits.

This class will take students back to the basics of handwriting, including proper pencil grip, formation of letters (manuscript/cursive), spacing of letters, legibility, and pacing/flow. We will begin with the importance of developing fine motor skills and proper pencil grip. Then students will learn the correct formation of approximately four letters per week. We will start each class by learning new letters, practicing the letter together, and then independent practice. We will also learn how to take hand breaks when our hands get tired from writing. Homework will include practice worksheets. Older students can expect small projects like writing notecards, creating a menu, etc., to help them practice.

The first half of the year will focus on manuscript uppercase and lowercase letters, and the second half will transition to cursive writing.

We will be reading and examining literary devices across various genres, and by the end of the course, students will have traveled through time and cultures. During our novel studies, this course will challenge students to make connections between their studies and the real world by integrating a cross-curricular approach: for this reason, we will weave history, politics, social studies, art, public speaking, internet research, and PowerPoint into this class.

Students will learn the art of the essay with a hands-on writing approach. I will set them up to succeed with weekly step-by-step tools and tricks needed to become confident and capable writers. Honors Classical Literature and Composition:

This series of literature and composition classes are preparatory not only for college but also for thinking about eternal truths and all of the deep issues that have challenged man from the beginning of recorded history. While science books must be updated every few years to reflect the new information that has been learned, we can study fictional texts from a hundred or several thousand years ago because they reveal unchanging truths about the nature of mankind. These truths go hand in hand with the truths of the Bible. We study some of the great texts in American and Western literature. Through learning how to write, students can learn how to think logically, organize their thoughts, and convey their thoughts to others.

General Expectations for All Honors Classes:

1. Students are expected to attend classes regularly, be prepared with all materials needed for each class, turn in assignments on time, and participate each week.
2. I do not accept late papers except with an excused absence and notification from parents. My goal is to cultivate accountability in students that will serve them the rest of their lives. It is a skill that must be acquired for success, and they need to cultivate it now when the consequences are not as great as they will be in the future.
3. I highly recommend that your student be working through a grammar and spelling program (including punctuation!) at home, especially if they have problems in these areas. There are many good programs out there; simply pick one that suits your needs and then put it in your schedule. Your student will thank you later. Also, I deduct points for grammar, punctuation, and spelling on grading writing assignments as you will see on my grading rubrics later. People are judged for their spelling and grammar as adults in their professional life.
4. There is homework every week, sometimes more, sometimes less, but it is weekly. Reading the assignment is a paramount part of the homework. Participation in the discussion in class hinges on having read the text for the day and participation is part of the grade.
5. There will be at home reading quizzes and final examinations (taken either partly or wholly at home).

** This class fulfills two high school credits—one US History and one Bible Elective.

American History Portion: Students will survey American history from the time of the Native Americans and first European explorers through the administration of President Barack Obama. The course discusses actions and developments on the national level, especially involving the federal government, as well as issues and events in American culture. A special emphasis is placed on the role of slavery and subsequent racial issues in American history. This goes beyond simply memorizing historical facts.

Bible Portion: Students will examine developments in American religious history, from the role of religion in the founding of the colonies to contemporary moral and spiritual issues such as abortion and evolution. We will study American religious movements such as the First and Second Great Awakenings, Fundamentalism, and religious groups founded in America. The goal of this class is to teach students to engage in a complete conversation. Homework is the key to learning languages and keeping good grades.

Spanish 2: Your student continues these varied skills. An audio-lingual approach (hearing and speaking) is used within a friendly and informal atmosphere. Active participation is the key ingredient, and a wide variety of activities provide opportunities to practice. The goal of this class is to teach students to engage in a complete conversation. Creative Art

The Creative Art Class teaches individual creativity through art projects. Emphasis is placed on composition and design elements to ensure a working piece of artwork. The students focus on learning to “see” design by doing projects and assignments rather than thorough lectures. Each student will accomplish artwork that expresses his or her way of seeing, with guidance from the teacher in the form of suggestions and critiques. Art should be fun and rewarding in order to give students a sense of accomplishment. We will also have references to Master Artists and their techniques.

Acrylic Painting (Ages 12-18)

This two-hour class affords your student time to watch the demonstrations and practice the application of each lesson.

Artistry in Fiber (Ages 12-18)

Artistry in Fiber is an exploration into the fiber arts. We work with wool, yarn, fabrics, cord and combinations to create wonderful works of art. This class may include Macrame, Felting, Pom Pom, Embroidery, Strip Cloth collage, Needle Punch and so much more.

This class works on a rotation of mediums, so each year has new art forms to learn. We also use dyes and alcohol inks to enhance our pieces. Please feel free to come by and see the examples of each style of fabric arts in Mrs. Barefield’s classroom.

Note: This class will have homework. Students will finish the bases and framework at home and instruction and practice of the next steps will be given in class.

Calligraphy (Ages 12-18)

This class will learn how to use calligraphy pens, brush pens as well as fine markers to create beautiful lettering art. This is a great exploration class in that we will be drawing in ink using different pens, including Microns, Prismacolor, Sharpie, alcohol- and water-based markers and Tombow brush pens to create beautiful artwork. We will experiment with alcohol inks, India inks, gouche, and liquid acrylics to add color to the pieces. A wide variety of art papers including Bristol vellum board, Yupo, watercolor paper, marker paper, and mixed media will be used in class. Students will build confidence in their ability to draw.

Visit Mrs. Barefield's classroom or the office to see samples of the abstract (line and design), Impressionism (depth, use of color), and realism (working from photographs) forms of pen and ink taught and practiced in this exciting new class.

MUSIC

Guitar, Piano, Violin/Viola/Cello

Guitar (all ages)

Brendan Gilman ...\$98.00 per month (30 min. private lessons)

Supply Fee: \$20

This class is taught using the student's personal musical interests as a guide to learn music theory, chords, scales, and the fundamentals of playing music on his or her own and with others. Each lesson is tailored to the individual, and special attention is focused on goal setting with the end result being students learning music that excites them and encourages practice at home.

Piano (all ages)

Spring Seals...\$98.00 per month...(30 min. private lessons)

Supply Fee: \$25/semester

This course is for any student wishing to pursue the study of music through private piano lessons. Music theory, music history, and music appreciation will be included alongside piano instruction.

Instruction is personally tailored to meet the individual's needs and goals. Students will learn to play the piano with proper technique through fun exercises and appropriate pieces for their level. A variety of styles of music including hymns, jazz, popular, and classical music will enhance the learning environment by offering students a rich musical experience.

Students are required to have an acoustic piano or full-size digital piano (88 weighted keys) at home for practice.

Piano students are expected to practice a minimum of 5 days per week, regular practice is the "homework" for piano lessons. Recitals are offered at the end of each semester and all students are encouraged to participate. Enrollment in piano is considered a year-long commitment. Contact Spring Seals to schedule a trial lesson if desired before enrolling.

Theater Champs (Ages 13–18)

From where I sit, Theater is the greatest team sport ever. Theater takes a group of strangers and knits them into a community that creates something that is bigger than any one person could create alone.

Theater is physically and mentally challenging. You will be stretched. You will increase the number of your brain synapses - which frequently leads to greater success in other areas of life. You will learn not only to shine when the spotlight is on you, but to support and cheer for your fellow actors - for when they succeed, you succeed as well.

Every class will include physical, mental, and vocal warm-ups, designed to hone the actors' tools of mind, voice and body. Many of the exercises are based on Viola Spolin's "Improvisation for the Theater." The exercises look like games. They are actually scientifically proven ways of sharpening thinking, heightening reactions, and enabling actors to clearly express emotion and motivation on stage.

Each actor will be learning and performing monologues, scenes from stage plays and movies, and doing many activities designed to help him or her learn to 'think like an actor'. We will perform a play at the end of the school year, to celebrate all that we have learned. Participation is required.

Because teenagers' brains grow significantly each year, the class is suitable for both new and returning students. There will be new material and activities for second year students. First year students will be welcomed and made to feel part of the group. I have had students take the class five years - and they learned more each year. Actors will be required to work on scenes outside of class. Weekly attendance is vital. And having fun is mandatory.

DANCE
Ballet, Tap

Ballet/Tap - Beginning (Ages 5-7)

Lori Brown ... \$50.00 per month (1 hour)

This is a fun class for beginning dancers. They will learn large movement motor skills using a variety of props (crowns, wands, scarfs, ribbons) and imaginary themes that engage the early learner. The dancers will learn positions of feet and arms and early ballet terms as they navigate their way into the world of dance. Technique is emphasized first semester with an emphasis on choreography second semester.

Beginners- Intermediate Dance Movement (Ages 7-18)

Introduction to Computer (Ages 5-10)

All kids love computers, but it can be scary, as a parent, to allow a child to work at one because those little fingers have tendencies to click, click and click until the machine doesn't quite work like it should. However, in this course, students will learn how to operate a computer in a productive manner.

Students are always so excited when they arrive to class each week. They will go wild as they learn to create fun and exciting projects on **Microsoft Word**, learn to compile and present **PowerPoint** slideshows (the look on their faces and the squeal in their voices are priceless when they see their creations come to life thorough animations), as well as learn to navigate **Excel**. Educational computer games are also incorporated into the class to teach various skills.

Upon completion of this class, students will no longer fear or feel overwhelmed when they sit down at a computer. It is recommended that students know their letters and numbers, but it is not required.

A COMPUTER APPLICATIONS CLASS IS A REQUIRED CLASS FOR TEXAS HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES.

In this course, students will learn the basic and essential skills of four of the most common Microsoft Office applications (Word, Excel, PowerPoint). Each computer is equipped with a month-to-month subscription of Office 365, allowing students to always access the newest version of Microsoft Office.

In Word, students will not only learn how to create documents with proper margins, headers, footers, footnotes, bibliographies, and tables, but they will also become computer literate as they learn the various tools and commands of Word. Some projects include: making brochures, business cards, sales ads, flyers, digital art, and more. Proper internet research and digital citizenship will also be covered as they build their projects.

In PowerPoint, students will learn how to create a slide show and present it to an audience in a professional manner. They will learn how to add graphics, sound, moving text, videos, photos, and other visual enhancements, which are all essential in keeping the audience interested. But what good is a fabulous slide show if you do not know how to properly present it to an audience? We will discuss the dos and don'ts of presenting, and the students will have the opportunity to put their learned skills to use as they make a presentation to the class.

More than ever, there is a need for people of all ages, from all backgrounds, with all types of life experience to be leaders that inspire others to dream, to participate and to persevere.

This class is designed to help students understand their own leadership skills and work to improve them. We will focus on Leading By Example, Knowing and Sharing Your Vision, Inspiring Others, Taking Risks, Enabling Others to Act and Encouraging/Rewarding Others.

The first place to look for leadership is within oneself. Each student will be given tools that enable them to measure their current leadership strengths and weaknesses, personality type and conflict management style. These tools will help each student make a plan for improvement, and commit to growing as a leader.

Debate (Ages 13-18)

Zandrah Kurland ...\$50.00 per month (1 hour)

Supply Fee: TBD

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 8

Prerequisite: Skills necessary for this class is the ability to present speeches with a key word outline or memorized script, to write persuasive essays that motivate listeners to action, and to deconstruct arguments from its premises to conclusion. A background in worldview and philosophy classes will be helpful for Lincoln Douglas debate, but it is not necessary.

In a *Forbes* article titled, “How to Find the Millennials Who Will Lead Your company,” Robert Sher writes, “...search for those who competed in speech and debate competition in high school (or college) and hire them.” Sher wrote this after judging a local high-school debate tournament. Teens enjoy arguing. Give your student the skill to do it well. Debate teaches students to think analytically, listen attentively, and speak convincingly.

This class introduces the structure and strategies for various types of debate. Students will learn election debate as they campaign for the various leadership roles in the class. They will learn team policy (TP) debate as they work with a partner to draft policies that make the world a better place. Lastly, they will learn Lincoln Douglas (LD) debate when they argue for and against a resolution that requires them to examine questions of values, morality, and justice.

As students learn terminology and build their research and analytical skills they will have the opportunity to debate weekly. Topics may include “Resolved: A superhero action movie should be viewed this weekend over a drama” and will build up to “Resolved: Economic stability is more important than economic growth.” Researching and writing briefs will be part of their regular assignments. Taking responsibility in working with teammates will be expected. Students will also be encouraged to visit local tournaments and flow team policy and Lincoln Douglas debates as an extra learning aid to building their own arguments. The final project will be a team policy debate tournament using a resolution from either the NCFCA or STOA debate leagues. Parents are welcome to participate as judges in all of the debates.

At the high-school level, teens have already developed their worldview and are fine-tuning their personal opinions. Debate gives them a safe outlet to verify, finesse, persuade, and defend their

ideas. Parents may have to cajole their teens to complete their math assignment or start their literary analysis, but debate makes researching, strategizing, analyzing, reading, writing, and speaking an enjoyable game that gives students a great sense of accomplishment.

Topics include photo composition, famous photographers, historical developments in photography, photo essays, still life and macrophotography, studio lighting, portraits, permission (basic photographic law), post processing using DXO & Adobe® Photoshop® as well as other “fun topics.”

Expect weekly homework assignments, individualized projects, and four field trips. Field trips will be during class hours.

Required equipment: Digital camera. A smart phone with a built-in camera is sufficient.

Supplies: Students who need a camera may check-out a Nikon DSLR (Digital Single Lens Reflex) camera for practice.

** This class can be used to fulfill high school credits in philosophy or sociology, church history or Bible.

This course will prepare students to defend their faith and counter the culture.
