Middle School and High School:

Bridge Science (Ages 11-12)

Supply Fee: \$75

Note: Maximum number is 15 students, so sign up early!

Let's explore how God designed things to work! This class is intended to "bridge the gap" between students' abilities and interests in elementary science and our existing Life Science class.

During the first semester, students will utilize various works by David Macaulay as well as fun hands-on activities to discover scientific principles, simple machines, architecture, and the engineering design process. The second semester will focus on an engaging and interactive introduction to the human body. Students will keep lab notebooks to record their vocabulary, drawings, and observations. Disclaimer: This course includes a woolly mammoth!

<u>Required texts</u>: The Way Things Work Now: From Levers to Lasers, Windmills to Wi-fi, a Visual Guide to the World of Machines, by David Macaulay, and The Human Body (God's Design), by Debbie and Richard Lawrence (this book can also be purchased as part of a larger textbook called God's Design for Life MB Edition, by the same authors). Life Science (Ages 11–13)

Supply Fee: \$75

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 2. Maximum number of students: 20

Get ready to discover more about the awesome detail and intricacy of God's creation! Learn about the scientific method, scientific analysis, the classification system, and significant scientific discoveries while exploring a variety of topics in the life sciences. In addition to the experiments/explorations in the book, we will practice classifying leaves, insects, and wildflowers, dissect a worm, frog, starfish, sheep's brain and heart. We will also explore how human actions can positively or negatively impact environments.

The students will have weekly homework assignments covering material in the text, weekly quizzes, and four tests over the course of the year. Additionally, each student will practice keeping a lab note-book, that serves as a record of the details of class experiments, explorations, and observations. There is also a 4th quarter field trip to BRIT/The Fort Worth Botanic Gardens.

<u>Required text</u>: *Exploring Creation with General Science*, Third Edition, Seligson, Apologia Ed. Ministries. (Student TEXT ONLY)

Physical Science (Ages 13–14)

Scott Davis ... \$100.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$70

This course covers chemistry, physics, and Earth science topics which will give the middle school student the knowledge they need to be prepared for high school courses.

Lab experiences will dominate class time and all the experiments in the text will be included.

The student will also solve a crime using chemistry, learn to identify and separate substances, discover the properties of dry ice, build a matchbook rocket, and apply math skills to science thorough working with measurements within the metric system.

Although it is generally recommended as an 8th-grade course, students can use it for their 9thgrade coursework. The students have weekly homework assignments and are tested when modules are completed. They will be encouraged to study independently and learn how to prepare for tests. A lab manual will be kept in the classroom and graded twice a year.

<u>**Prerequisite:**</u> Successful completion of 7th grade math. The math portion of the Physical Science course involves:

- Converting measurements/units
- Simple rearranging of equations
- Dividing and multiplying fractions

<u>Required text</u>: (*Do not purchase*) *Exploring Creation with Physical Science*, 3rd Edition, Dincher, Apologia Educational Ministries and *Test and Solutions Manual*. (The Student Notebook is not needed.) Textbook will be available to borrow all year from Mr. Davis. Students may purchase an e-copy if desired.

Meteorology (Ages 15-18)

Scott Davis ... \$104.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: TBD

Learn how God formed the Earth and created a sequence of three atmospheres ending in what we breathe today. This course uses a non-calculus-based approach to understanding the physics, thermodynamics, and chemistry of our atmosphere. Subjects, to name a few, are atmospheric composition and structure, what makes the wind, why do we have seasons, gas laws, theory of the rainbow, why is the sky blue, cloud and rain formation, why is water so important, highs lows cold fronts and the jet stream, thunderstorms hurricanes and tornadoes, and ... wait-for-it ... climate change.

Additionally, we will 'read the sky' every day, by looking out the window and walking outside, then running back to the classroom to understand how, what we just saw, is formed and what it tells us about today's and tomorrow's weather.

In addition to some classroom experiments and demos, the sky will be our laboratory. God made the laws of physics. We humans just try to understand what He built, by discovering and writing equations that describe how His world works.

<u>**Prerequisite:**</u> The student must understand simple algebra (manipulate equations), bring some concepts of geometry (shapes, area, volume), and need to be teachable on very basics of trigonometry (sine, cosine, tangent). An understanding of forces, energy, electromagnetic radiation, and water chemistry will be helpful but not necessary.

Biology (Ages 15-16)

Chris Morris ... \$104.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$75

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 2. Maximum number of students: 20

Be awed by God's creation. This course uses experiential learning to develop a strong background in microscopy, cellular biology, and ecosystems with a lesser emphasis on biochemistry and Mendelian genetics.

Complete a survey of the organisms classified in the five kingdoms. Examine organisms using a microscope. Learn to identify flora and fauna through class activities. Dissect a worm, clam, crayfish, grasshopper, fish, frog, and fetal pig.

Students will have weekly homework assignments, weekly quizzes, quarterly projects, and four quarter final tests. Student lab notebooks will also be graded quarterly. There is no math requirement; however, there are 368 vocabulary words on the docket (fair warning!)

<u>Required text</u>: *Exploring Creation with Biology*, Third Edition, Dincher, (TEXT ONLY) Apologia Educational Ministries.

Chemistry (Ages 15-18)

Carol Hofford...\$104.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$75

This course gives the student a rigorous foundation in chemistry. It covers classification of matter, the mole concept, stoichiometry, thermodynamics, kinetics, acids and bases, redox reactions, solutions, atomic structure, molecular geometry, the gas laws, and equilibrium. Students will perform the textbook experiments and experiments from the supplementary Microchemistry booklet. The students have weekly homework assignments and a biweekly test. Each student will also keep a lab manual.

<u>Prerequisite:</u> Algebra I must be successfully completed. The student should own a calculator and know how to use it.

<u>Required text:</u> *Discovering Design with Chemistry*, Dr. Jay L. Wile, Published by Berean Builders and the *Test Booklet and Answer Key*.

Science Etc.

Physics (Ages 17-18)

Dwight Debenport ... \$104.00 per month (2 hours)

Physics is one of the oldest academic disciplines. In this course we will study motion, energy, and the rules that govern our universe. My goal with this class is to give students a strong conceptual understanding of the rules of spacetime and prepare STEM-minded students for college level Physics. We will cover Newton's Laws & Applications, the Physics of Motion, Work & Energy, Momentum, Gravity, Waves, Optics, Electricity, and Magnetism. Each week I introduce the topic from the text, and we work examples together before doing an activity that requires application, analysis, and/or synthesis of the information.

Students should expect to spend at least 4 hours outside of class studying. This course requires an understanding of algebraic principles and should be taken after completing Algebra 1 and Geometry.

<u>Required</u>: TI-83 or -84 graphing calculator, any edition, or an iPad or laptop with access to Desmos to bring to every class.

<u>Required text:</u> *Exploring Creation with Physics,* 2nd Edition, Jay L. Wile, and the Solutions and Tests book.

Marine Biology (Ages 17-18)

Chris Morris ...\$104.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$75

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 2. Maximum number of students: 20

Dive deep into God's creation by studying the organisms that live in and near the oceans which cover nearly three fourths of the globe. Students learn about marine life in each of the five kingdoms through class activities. While marine biomes are the focus of the class, an understanding of ecology is central to the course. Since we live far from salt water, we will study some organisms that live in ecosystems close to us as well as those in tidal zones and those unbelievably far from us in the deepest depths of the ocean.

This course uses experiential learning to develop a strong understanding of ecosystems and the various types of symbiotic relationships seen in the marine environment. We will dissect a clam, starfish, shark, and squid. We will examine how ecologists study the various ecosystems as well as explore how human actions can positively or negatively impact these ecosystems. Students will have weekly homework assignments, weekly quizzes, quarterly projects, and four quarter final tests. Student lab notebooks will also be graded quarterly. There is no math requirement.

<u>Required text</u>: *Exploring Creation with Marine Biology*, 2nd Edition, Sherri Seligson, Apologia Educational Ministries (Student TEXT ONLY).

<u>MATHMATICS</u> Math Teaching Games, Saxon 5/4, Saxon 6/5, Saxon 7/6, Pre- Algebra, Geometry, Algebra 1 &2, Pre-Calculus, Consumer Math

Elementary School:

Math Teaching Games 1 (Ages 5-6)

Kelly Sterling...\$47.00 per month (1 hour)

Supply Fee: \$30

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 4

Designed for Kindergarten and 1st grade math levels.

This class will introduce students to math concepts number recognition, counting, place value, numerals, shapes, length, money, skip counting and more.

The first part of the class will focus on introducing new concepts and practicing math facts. The second part of the class will focus on playing games related to the concepts learned that day.

This course is designed to challenge, strengthen, and solidify math concepts, while balancing it out with fun "hands-on" manipulatives and activities. I desire for students to have an understanding that math has a strong connection to the world around them.

Math Teaching Games 2 (Ages 7-8)

Kelly Sterling...\$47.00 per month (1 hour)

Supply Fee: \$30

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 4

Designed for 2nd and 3rd grade math levels. Students should know addition/subtraction math facts.

This class will introduce students to math concepts including telling time to the minute, graphing data, fractions, measurements, symmetry, geometry, adding two- and three-digit numbers up to 100, introduction to multiplication and division, money, word problems, perimeter, and area, rounding numbers, etc.

The first part of the class will focus on introducing new concepts and practicing math facts. The second part of the class will focus on playing games related to the concepts learned that day.

This course is designed to challenge, strengthen, and solidify math concepts, while balancing it out with fun "hands-on" manipulatives and activities. I desire for students to have an understanding that math has a strong connection to the world around them.

Students will be expected to work on math facts ten minutes each day outside of class.

Math Teaching Games 3 (Ages 9-10)

Kelly Sterling... \$47.00 per month (1 hour)

Supply Fee: \$30

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 4

Designed for 4th & 5th grade math level. Students should know multiplication/division math facts.

This class is intended to be a support class to your current math curriculum at home. I will work with you and your child to tailor instruction and games that will build his or her math abilities in a fun and encouraging way. It is intended to be a class with an enjoyable atmosphere with many thought-provoking activities and games related to your child's level of math.

This class will work on memorizing the facts you would like your child to learn. The child will either work on addition/subtraction, multiplication/division or percentages/fractions. Students will be expected to work on math facts ten minutes each day outside of class.

The first part of the class will focus on introducing new concepts, practicing math facts, and independent learning centers. The second part of the class will focus on playing games related to the concepts learned that day.

Many challenging math skills can be learned through play, and your child won't even know it. I hope this will be a very creative class as we blend games and individualized instruction to support your curriculum at home.

<u>Saxon Math 5/4 (Ages 9–10)</u>

Kelly Sterling...\$47.00 per month (1 hour)

Supply Fee: \$25

Saxon 5/4 is designed for students in grade 4, or grade 5 students who are struggling with math. Saxon 5/4 is a step-by-step integrated approach perfect for many 8–10-year-olds. Saxon curriculum is well known for the way it provides "incremental development with continual practice and review."

The students will begin by reviewing a variety of concepts such as subtraction, place value, and missing addends. The lessons increase in difficulty to include adding three-digit numbers, subtracting numbers with re-grouping, reading time, multiplying three or more factors, dividing with two-digit answers, simple fractions and more.

Parents will grade homework, so students can correct errors immediately. Tests will be taken in class and graded by the teacher. Student learning is supported by teacher created videos.

<u>Required text:</u> Saxon Math 5/4 Homeschool Kit, 3rd Edition (ISBN: 1591413478, ISBN-13: 9781591413479), Kit includes Student Text, Tests and Worksheets, and Solutions Manual.

Middle School and High School:

Saxon Math 6/5 (Ages 11-12) Kelly Sterling... \$50.00 per month (1 hour)

Saxon 6/5 is designed for students in grade 5, or grade 6 students who are struggling with math. Saxon 6/5 is a step-by-step integrated approach perfect for many 9–12-year- olds. Saxon curriculum is well known for the way it provides "incremental development with continual practice and review."

The students will build on addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. Students will learn about making a multiplication table, adding/subtracting fractions with a common denominator, multiplying by multiples of 10 and 100, perimeter, simple probability, decimal parts of a meter, reciprocals, volume, square roots, graphing points on a coordinate plane, and more.

Parents will grade homework, so students can correct errors immediately. Tests will be taken in class and graded by the teacher. Student learning is supported by teacher created videos.

Saxon 7/6 (Ages 12-13)

Carol Hofford...\$100.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$25

The goal of this course is to build mathematical curiosity and determination as students discover God's mathematical order. Students should have a firm grasp of basic addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. We will explore functions and coordinate graphing, integers, exponential expressions, prime factorization, the order of operations, number lines, decimal place value, how to find the percent of a number, how to round decimal numbers, and attributes of geometric solids.

Homework will be completed, graded, and corrected at home each week before class. Tests will be taken in class and graded by the teacher.

Science Etc.

Pre-Algebra (Ages 12-13)

Carol Hofford...\$100.00 per month (2 hours)

The goal of this course is to build mathematical curiosity and determination as students discover God's mathematical order. Students will continue to expand their use of basic skills, learning new concepts about geometry, ratios and proportions, prime and composite numbers, fractions and decimals, algebraic reasoning, and the Pythagorean Theorem.

This curriculum constantly reviews material while introducing new concepts. Homework will be completed, graded, and corrected at home each week before class. Tests will be taken in class and graded by the teacher.

Required texts: Saxon Algebra 1/2, Student Text, 3rd edition and Saxon Algebra 1/2, Solutions Manual, 3rd edition

Algebra I (Ages 13-14)

Carol Hofford...\$100.00 per month (2 hours)

The goal of this course is to build mathematical curiosity and determination as students discover God's mathematical order. Students will continue to expand their knowledge of signed numbers, exponents, roots, absolute value, equations and inequalities, scientific notation, unit conversions, polynomials, graphs, quadratic equations, and much more.

This curriculum constantly reviews material while introducing new concepts. Homework will be completed, graded, and corrected at home each week before class. Tests will be taken in class and graded by the teacher.

Required texts: Saxon Algebra 1, 3rd edition, Student Text and Saxon Algebra 1, 3rd edition, Solutions Manual

Geometry (Ages 14-16)

Dwight Debenport... \$104.00 per month (2 hours)

We will study Euclidean facts regarding points, lines, angles, triangles, circles, polygons, solids and classical constructions and transformations. Some analytical geometry and trigonometry will be incorporated, and geometric relationships and deductive reasoning strategies will be used to solve problems. My intention is to expand on the Math U See curriculum and help my students make connections and see patterns in mathematics that make Geometry more comprehensible for them.

This course is a complement to the students' home study of mathematics. It provides the pacing, structure, and grades. Each week I introduce the topic from the text, and we work examples together before doing an activity that requires application, analysis, and/or synthesis of the

information. Some students may benefit from a parent or tutor working with them on homework for approximately 1 hour per week and all should expect to spend an additional 4 hours per week working outside of class.

Geometry is recommended after completion of Algebra 1 and before Algebra 2, but with instructor approval it may be taken after Algebra 2 or concurrently with Algebra 2.

<u>Required</u>: TI-83 or -84 graphing calculator, any edition, or an iPad or laptop with access to Desmos to bring to every class.

Algebra 2 (Ages 15-17)

Dwight Debenport... \$104.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$30

Algebra II provides the basis for advanced STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) study. It builds on evaluation and graphing concepts learned in Algebra 1 and covers imaginary numbers; rational, exponential, logarithmic expressions; conic sections; and an introduction to trigonometry and matrices. Activities include using our graphing calculators to write beginner-level programs and explore function behavior. My intention is to expand on the Math U See curriculum and help my students make connections and see patterns in mathematics that make Algebra II more comprehensible for them.

This challenging course is a complement to the students' home study of mathematics. It provides pacing, structure, and grades. Each week I introduce the topic from the text, and we work examples together before doing an activity that requires application, analysis, and/or synthesis of the information. Some students may benefit from a parent or tutor working with them on homework for approximately 1 hour per week and all should expect to spend an additional 4 hours per week working outside of class.

<u>Required</u>: TI-83 or -84 graphing calculator, any edition, or an iPad or laptop with access to Desmos to bring to every class.

<u>Required text:</u> Math-U-See Algebra II Student Pack (available at store.mathusee.com and possibly Amazon.com), and Math-U-See Algebra II Instruction Manual, edition 2009 or newer (used is perfectly fine!).

Consumer Math (Ages 15-18)

Kelly Sterling...\$104.00 per month (2 hours)

Students will study and review arithmetic skills they can apply in their personal lives and in their future careers. The first half of the year begins with a focus on occupational topics; it includes details on jobs, wages, deductions, taxes, insurance, spending, buying on credit, and checking/savings accounts. The second half of the year will focus on personal finances, automobile/transportation, housing (renting and buying), loans and financing, and budgeting.

Math skills and concepts covered in this course include whole numbers, fractions, decimals, percentages, mean, median, mode, basic operations on a calculator, computing mentally and estimating.

Pre-Calculus (Ages 17-18)

Dwight Debenport... \$104.00 per month (2 hours)

Supply Fee: \$30

Pre-Calculus teaches concepts and builds on calculator fluency that must be mastered before enrollment in a college-level calculus course. The emphasis will be on Trigonometry, and we will focus on making the math click for visual learners: representing functions graphically. Quadratic relations will be represented in polar and rectangular coordinates and parametric coordinates in the form of vectors. The course also builds on the formal study of functions and relations begun in Algebra 1 & 2 and introduces limits, providing a bridge to calculus. My intention is to expand on the Math U See curriculum and help my students make connections and see patterns in mathematics that make Pre-Calculus more comprehensible for them.

This course is a complement to the students' home study of mathematics. It provides pacing, structure, and grades. Each week I introduce the topic from the text, and we work examples together before doing an activity that requires application, analysis, and/or synthesis of the information. Students should expect to spend at least 4 hours outside of class studying.

<u>Required</u>: TI-83 or -84 graphing calculator, any edition. Access to an iPad or laptop with the Desmos app or online access to Desmos is a plus.

<u>Required text:</u> *Math-U-See Pre-Calculus Student Pack* (available at store.mathusee.com and possibly Amazon.com), and *Math-U-See Pre-Calculus Instruction Manual*, edition 2009 or newer (used is perfectly fine!).

<u>ENGLISH/LANGUAGE ARTS</u> Elementary Literature, Writing, Grammar and Spelling, Handwriting, Middle School Literature and Writing, Classical Literature & Writing, Debate, Public Speaking

Elementary School:

Foundations in Literature: Storytime (Ages 5-6)

Lara Lleverino...\$47.00 per month (1 hour)

Supply Fee: \$35

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make is 4. Maximum number of students is 10.

<u>**Prerequisite:**</u> Your child must be able to sit quietly and listen to stories and answer oral comprehension questions.

Content: This is a curated reading hour wrapped around a theme of a weekly phonic. Your student will be introduced to the literature appreciation tools of naming, attending, and storytelling. They will begin building their abilities to work and learn in community by listening and attending to the teacher and their classmates as they are introduced to some of the best of the best in literature. Each week a new phonic will be introduced, a story experienced, and a letter writing practiced followed by a second story. Phonics will follow the Wanda Sanseri Spell to Write and Read program. There is no homework or grades for this class, but ideas for continuing the phonics support at home can be provided to parents who use this as a jumping off place for handwriting and beginning reading.

Titles: 60 titles of curated literature. List provided upon request and at orientation.

Foundations in Literature: Introduction to Fairy Tales (Ages 7-8)

Lara Lleverino ... \$47.00 per month (1 hour)

Supply Fee: \$35

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 4. Maximum number of students: 10

<u>Prerequisite</u>: Your child should be able to read easy books (late first-grade at least) to do well in this class. For struggling readers parents should expect to read the stories with their students at home.

Content: This course is an introduction to literature and the art of reading and ordered thinking. The skills of identification, sustained attention, memorization, narration, and expression will be instructed and modeled in class and in take home assignments using age-appropriate literature. Students learn how to gather information from a story and to think critically while listening and reading a text. They will begin the habit training of seeing the world around them by the practice of sustained attention. They will practice the skill of memorization through oral recitation and narration.

Required books purchased by the teacher with the supply fee. The goal is to develop in students a love of reading and writing that will last a lifetime along with developing the skills of critical thinking to correctly order skepticism and awe.

Foundations in Literature: Introduction to Shakespeare (Ages 9-10)

Supply Fee: \$35

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 4. Maximum number of students: 10

<u>**Prerequisite:**</u> Reading level of at least the second grade. Students will be required to read selections weekly. The first semester will require in-class oral narrations before their classmates. Second semester will require additional written paragraph summaries along with oral in-class narrations.

Content: To develop in your student a love of good literature that will last a lifetime. The experience of reading two different editions of 16 different Shakespeare tales and discussion of the similarities and differences will provide a strong foundation for later high school honors level analysis and synthesis of classical literature.

Grammar/Spelling 1 (Ages 7–8)

In this course, your child will learn parts of speech that include nouns, pronouns, verbs, adjectives, adverbs, prepositions, and objects of prepositions. Using Shurley English and other materials, we will also cover the mechanics of a sentence, what makes a good sentence and then a good

paragraph. Toward the end of the year, your child will be writing short 2-point expository paragraphs. Class time will include mostly grammar practice, but I will sneak in a little spelling to round things out.

Note: There will be a homework packet each week for your child to complete on the days he/she is not in class.

<u>Prerequisite:</u> Your child must be able to read on at least a late first-grade reading level to take this course.

Grammar/Spelling 2 (Ages 8-9)

No new students may be added to this class after week 8 (We have covered too much material by then for your child to catch up.)

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 4. Maximum number of students: 12

This course expands on what your student has learned in Grammar 1. Although having taken Grammar 1 would make it a little easier, it is not completely necessary for taking Grammar 2, since there is a good deal of review at the beginning.

Using Shurley English as our starting point, we will continue with the parts of speech already learned but add layers to them. Did you know that different parts of speech are used differently depending on where they are in the sentence?

We will do lots of work on improving sentences, and paragraphs, and will expand on our expository writing.

This is foremost a grammar course, but there will also be spelling lessons and a little writing to cement the grammar skills.

Homework: There will be a homework packet each week for your child to complete on the days he/she is not in class.

<u>Prerequisite:</u> Your child needs to be reading on at least a second-grade level to do well in this course.

Grammar/Spelling 3 (Ages 9–10)

This course is a continuation of Grammar 2. It expands on the parts of speech, adding layers and adding new parts of speech. We will continue to use Shurley English as our base, with several new and different elements added.

If your child has had no Shurley English, you might consider signing up for the Grammar 2 class instead. Jumping right into the Grammar 3 class may prove difficult, since we cover a tremendous amount of material in the first two courses using nomenclature unique to Shurley English. It is the parents' choice, however.

<u>Prerequisite:</u> Your child needs to be reading on at least a fourth-grade level to do well in this course.

Handwriting (Ages 7-10)

Note: Minimum number of students for class to make: 4. Maximum number of students: 12

Handwriting is an essential skill used in many subjects for taking notes, taking tests, and doing classroom work and homework. It is also a skill used throughout one's life for jotting down notes, writing letters, filling out forms, and signing paperwork. Students are never too old to learn proper handwriting and/or correct bad handwriting habits.

This class will take students back to the basics of handwriting, including proper pencil grip, formation of letters (manuscript/cursive), spacing of letters, legibility, and pacing/flow. We will begin with the importance of developing fine motor skills and proper pencil grip. Then students will learn the correct formation of approximately four letters per week. We will start each class by learning new letters, practicing the letters together, and then independent practice. We will also learn how to take hand breaks when our hands get tired from writing. Homework will include practice worksheets. Older students can expect small projects like writing notecards, creating a menu, etc., to help them practice.

The first half of the year will focus on manuscript uppercase and lowercase letters, and the second half will transition to cursive writing.

Artistry in Fiber is an exploration into the fiber arts. We work with wool, yarn, fabrics, cord, and combinations to create wonderful works of art. This class may include Macrame, Felting, Pom Pom, Embroidery, Strip Cloth collage, Needle Punch and so much more.

This class works on a rotation of mediums, so each year has new art forms to learn. We also use dyes and alcohol inks to enhance our pieces. Please feel free to come by and see the examples of each style of fabric arts in Mrs. Barefield's classroom.

We will be using polymer clay to create realistic noses or hooves. I will be introducing silks, linen, and other fabrics to enhance the 2D or strengthen the 3d wet felted projects. Wet felting will be new this year. Making bowls, vases or scarves using wet felting and embellishments with needle felting. We will use a variety of techniques on our projects as well build them up (3D) or paint with the wool (2D).

Mixed Mediums (Ages 12–18)

Students will learn to play the piano with proper technique through fun exercises and appropriate pieces for their level. Students are required to have an acoustic piano or full-size digital piano (88 weighted keys) at home for practice. Piano students are expected to practice a minimum of 5 days per week; regular practice is the "homework" for piano lessons. Recitals are offered at the end of each semester and all students are encouraged to participate. Enrollment in piano is considered a year-long commitment. Contact the teacher to schedule a trial lesson if desired before enrolling.

Private Violin/Viola/Cello (Ages 8-adult)

Students will learn the foundation of String Instrument technique according to Western Tradition.
